The green finance team from Tha Bar Wa project conducted online trainings for about 40 loan officers and 20 trainers for all four partner banks during May and June. It is a two-session online training focused on energy efficiency measures and implementing renewable energy solutions in small and medium sized enterprises (SMEs) operation. The training is planned to end in July so that the banks can conduct and roll out further trainings for their staff in their branches and networks.

In collaboration with the Sagaing Division Chamber of Commerce and Industry (SDCCI), the Tha Bar Wa project organised a workshop on the topic of green finance to raise awareness on the project activities and how it supports businesses to gain access to green financial services from Banks. Experts from the project, including its partners and Mandalay Region Chamber of Commerce and Industry, led the sessions. 50 SME owners from Sagaing participated in this workshop.

Tha Bar Wa project participated in the 6th Myanmar National Food Expo in Yangon, organized by Myanmar Food Producer and Exporter Association (MFPEA). The project showcased its activities and how it has been supporting the Food and Beverage business for cleaner/ green production solutions. The Project booth was observed by various businesses, and many of them showed interest in future awareness workshops and in-depth trainings in the topics of wastewater treatment plants, energy efficiency, and renewable energy solutions.
